1. INNOVATION & CREATIVITY

- Driven to create meaningful change for youth in the community through their involvement in programs, committees, ideas and initiatives
- Works as a team player with peers and community members
- Motivated and energetic
- Involved in unique programs that support youth issues specific to their community
- Involved in networking to improve relations between peers and adults
- Has positive future goals to further skills and knowledge in community/youth service

2. VOLUNTEERISM

- Dedicated time commitment to volunteer initiatives and programs
- Variety of volunteer involvement within the school and larger community
- Is consistent and reliable
- Promotes volunteerism to peers

3. GENUINE CONCERN FOR ALL PEERS

- Candidate shows genuine concern for all youth (inclusive)
- Relates well to their peers and works hard to have an understanding of the varying issues that youth have
- Seeks understanding beyond their own interest and peer group

4. POSITIVE ROLE MODEL

- Peers look up to this candidate
- Peers can rely on this candidate
- Displays leadership and friendliness to peers and community
- Shows respect to peers and in community
- Works to involve and encourage peers in a leadership role

5. COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

- Is involved in a variety of programs and organizations
- Involved in program development and expansion
- Demonstrates commitment and consistency in their community involvement
- Energetic, positive, friendly to provide community with positive perception of
- Offers their involvement freely and with enthusiasm

6. USING COMMUNITY RESOURCES

- Makes good use of partnerships of people and organizations
- Acts as a resource to others
- Encourages peers to have better understanding of community resources
- Works with others to promote effective partnership and the future of collaboration

7. PROMOTES YOUTH INVOLVEMENT

- Gets peers excited and enthusiastic to get involved
- Promotes education and interest in youth issues in the community
- Supports better understanding of youth driven programs and initiatives in the community

8. DOCUMENTED OUTCOMES

- Letters of support from peers, community members, politicians, teachers, service groups and service providers, police service, youth workers
- Media documentation of community/school involvement
- Although not required, we encourage creative submissions that reflect the energy of youth!
